EPA Research Opportunity: Biofuel Climate Change Model Validation Research
Apply by December 2, 2019
Applications Accepted on Rolling Basis

Two research opportunities are currently available at the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) Office of Transportation and Air Quality (OTAQ). This appointment may be served at EPA Headquarters in Washington, DC or at the EPA's National Vehicle and Fuel Emissions Laboratory (NVFEL) in Ann Arbor, Michigan.

The project entails research on validation of transportation climate modeling with a focus on biofuels. The project will involve research on model evaluation techniques and on developing tools to automate comparison of model outputs with data and projections from other sources to improve evaluation and communication of EPA's modeling.

Under the guidance of a mentor, the participant will review an integrated assessment model that EPA is using for transportation/biofuel climate change analysis and review techniques to validate the model through comparison of the model's output with other data sources and projections. The participant will also research methods for automating future model validation. The participant will use an open source programming language (e.g., R, Python) to compare model outputs with other well-established sources of data on transportation fuels and agricultural commodities (e.g., prices, production, land use).

USDOT Webinar - TSMO and the MOD Vision: Concepts and Examples Wednesday, November 20, 2019 from 10 to 11:30 am Pacific

As States and municipalities start to consider emerging mobility innovations, they will see the convergence and integration of infrastructure, services, technologies, and policies bringing a broader spectrum of travel choices in daily travel. Simultaneously, traveler expectations are changing as traveler increasingly expect real-time, dynamic, actionable information on travel options before and during their trips. Meanwhile, from a system manager point of view, integration of Mobility on Demand (MOD)-related services and programs with the overall transportation system is necessary to ensure reliable and efficient travel for all users.

This webinar helps participants see the linkages between Transportation Systems Management and Operations (TSMO) and MOD. The webinar identifies the connections between TSMO and MOD to balance demand and supply on the system. Two recent and ongoing regional and State efforts in this area are presented. Recent research and reference material from FHWA on TSMO and its role in supporting MOD and travel demand management are also highlighted.
